Blackfriars Talks Friday 25th April

The Birth of the Gloucester & Berkeley Canal

Tony Conder 10-11am £10 / £6 Livestreamed



This weekend marks the anniversary of the Grand Opening of the Gloucester and Berkeley Canal. Planned in 1792, Gloucester expected much from its canal link to the sea. For 34 years the city endured frustration, financial stress and the promise of a new economic future while a series of engineers failed to live up to promised opening dates. Using eyewitness accounts and glorious illustrations **Tony Conder**, one of Britain's leading experts on canals and waterways, tells the story of the frantic preparations and dizzy excitement of the opening day as Gloucester became 'the emporium of the West'.

King Offa & The Triumph of the Anglo-Saxons

Battered by the Vikings, succeeded by King Alfred, the great Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Mercia (AD 630-918) encompassed today's Gloucestershire and powered the rise of England. Bestselling archaeologist and historian **Max Adams** explores the golden age of Mercia – its landscapes, peoples, conflicts and power struggles. He tells the thrilling story of King Offa, described by Alfred as 'the vigorous king who terrified all neighbouring kings', explores the building of his great Dyke and reveals the equal status Offa afforded his wife Cynethryth, making them the first real power couple of early Medieval England.

James I: The Life and Loves of Britain's First King

This year marks the 400th anniversary of the death of James I. Beginning with the mysterious murder of his father in 1567, his life encompassed kidnapping, witchcraft trials, his mother's beheading, poison, espionage, brothels and a passionate love affair with the Duke of Buckingham. James I biographer **Gareth Russell** discusses his extraordinary life and loves with historian **Lucy Hughes-Hallett** author of the dazzling and acclaimed biography of Buckingham, *The Scapegoat*. to Edward II during that fateful visit to Gloucestershire and whether he does in fact lie in a tomb in Gloucester Cathedral.

Maverdine Lane: England's Greatest Tudor Façade

The Old Judges House on Maverdine Lane (26 Westgate St) is the finest Tudor facade in the entire country. It revealed its amazing secrets for the first time during recent restoration work. Festival President **Janina Ramirez** was lucky enough to climb the scaffolding for a rare and exclusive glimpse of its splendours and took a film crew with her! Today she reveals what she saw and shares the filmed footage for the very first time. She's joined by top Historic England Architect **Chris Miners** and leading local historian **Phil Moss** to tell the intriguing story of this beautiful ancient gem. Bendor Grosvenor

Law and Politics: Has the Rule of Law Broken Down?

Former Lord Chancellor and Justice Secretary **Alex Chalk**, now a barrister again, joins former Gloucester MP **Richard Graham** for a frank discussion, spilling the beans about the realities of Westminster decision-making and the shortcomings we face. Trump and Putin: A New World Order?

David Omand, Jade McGlynn & Sinclair McKay 4-5pm £12 / £6 Livestreamed



How has the world changed since Trump came to power? What are the security implications of a new relationship between America and Russia? And what useful parallels can we draw from 20th century history? **David Omand** is Britain's



top intelligence guru, former Head of GCHQ and Home Office Permanent Secretary. Russia and Ukraine expert **Jade McGlynn** is a Fellow of King's College London's War Studies Department and historian **Sinclair McKay**, author of *St Petersburg*, is an expert on the history of 20th century Europe. They join the BBC's Vernon Harwood to assess current events, reflect on how we've got here and what the future may bring.

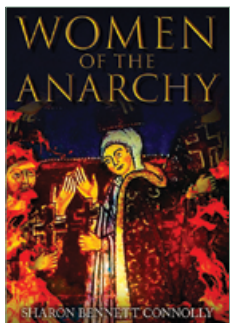

Empress Matilda: Medieval Cousins at War

In 1135 Stephen of Blois usurped the throne sparking the Anarchy, a bitter 19-year Civil War. On the one side was Empress Matilda, daughter of Henry I and rightful heir to the throne, on the other Matilda of Boulogne wife of Stephen and fighting to see her own son inherit the English crown.

Join leading medieval historian **Sharon Bennett Connolly**, author of *Women of the Anarchy*, for the dazzling tale of two extraordinary cousins who shaped the English monarchy, and the intriguing role of Robert of Gloucester.

Palestinians & Israelis: From The Balfour Declaration to Gaza

The ongoing struggle between Israel and Palestine is one of the world's most bitter conflicts. But what's the history behind it? Middle East expert **Michael Scott-Baumann** explores its origins from the Ottoman Empire to the present day. He examines the key flash points, the early involvement of the British, the establishment of the state of Israel in 1948, the Six-Day War of 1967 and Trump's peace plan, pitched as "the deal of the century". He explores why efforts to restore peace have continually failed and what it might take to succeed. An indispensable event for anyone seeking to understand the context behind today's headlines.

Eleanor of Provence & Medieval Gloucester

Andrew Armstrong, Sharon Bennett Connolly & Dean Irwin

Eleanor of Provence, Queen of England, wife of Henry III and mother of Edward I, often visited medieval Gloucester and after Henry's death was responsible for the expulsion of Gloucester's Jewish community from the city in the dramatic events of January 1275. Historian of medieval queens, **Sharon Bennett Connolly**, medieval Jewish history expert **Dean Irwin** and City Archaeologist **Andrew Armstrong** tell her story, and explore life in 13th century Gloucester when the lamprey-loving Royal Court came to town. Chaired by Jo Durrant.

Michael Heseltine

Michael Heseltine is one of our last great statesmen and has been at the forefront of British politics for 60 years. The former Deputy Prime Minister explores his stellar political career and shares new revelations about his time in Margaret Thatcher's cabinet in the '80s, John Major's government in the '90s and more recently when David Cameron returned him to the corridors of power. He offers a damning assessment of what he considers the grievous self-harm inflicted by Brexit and offers an urgent agenda to rebuild Britain. Chaired by the BBC's Vernon Harwood.



My Home is My Castle

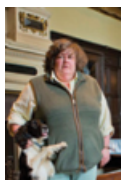

Luke Pepera 6-7pm £10 / £6 Livestreamed

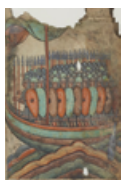
