Roman Glevum: The Final 100 Years

Neil Holbrook Time: 12.00-1.00pm £10





The Roman name for Gloucester was Glevum, best translated as 'the bright city'. It was one of only a handful of towns in Britain that had the highest legal status as a colony (colonia) of Roman citizens.

In a compelling new talk Cotswold Archaeology chief

Neil Holbrook explores the city's last century from c AD 350-450. Was this a period of slow decline, or were the city's fortunes little diminished right up until the end of the Roman period? Evidence, some of it brand new, for high-ranking officials drawn from across the Roman Empire in Gloucester in the 5th century provides tantalising insights into the importance of the town at the time when Britain was ceasing to be recognisably Roman.

Blackfriars: The Priory & its People Phil Moss Time: 2.00-3.00pm £10





Leading local historian **Phil Moss** reveals the intriguing story of Blackfriars Priory, built in 1249, home to Britain oldest surviving library building and a stunning architectural time capsule. He tells its extraordinary tale through the lives of its dwellers between the 13th and 19th centuries. From the medieval friar who went roque

causing the townsfolk to lay siege to the building to Thomas Bell, the Bill Gates of Elizabethan Gloucester, who saved the Priory from destruction by Henry VIII. And from Raikes the Elder who printed the 18th century Gloucester Journal at the Priory to Thomas Talbot who manufactured his bestselling Victorian mineral water, the Evian of its day, right here at Blackfriars.

From The Adoration of the Magi by Georges Trubert and Portrait of an Unknown Man by Jan Mostaert to Barack Obama by Kehinde Wiley, Black subjects have been portrayed in Western art for nearly a millennium. Opera singer and Radio 3 broadcaster **Peter Brathwaite** takes

But he didn't come to the throne alone. He had married the feisty and formidable Eleanor of Aquitaine ten years before and with them the Angevin Empire was born. Historian, TV

presenter and host of the Gone Medieval podcast **Matthew Lewis** tells the gripping story of the ultimate medieval power couple examining the impact of their union on European politics, and the rise and demise of the Angevin Empire which spread from the Northumberland coast to Mediterranean shores.

Finding Whitefriars: The Rediscovery of Gloucester's Lost Friary Andrew Armstrong Time: 8.00-9.00pm £10





You might be familiar with St Oswald's Priory, Llanthony Priory, Blackfriars and Greyfriars, but Gloucester actually had a fifth friary - the Whitefriars. This Carmelite Friary built in 1270 was a thriving and vital part of the medieval city. Today nothing survives above ground, but the King's Quarter redevelopment provided a thrilling once in a generation opportunity to solve the

mystery of this magnificent lost building. In a compelling talk City Archaeologist **Andrew Armstrong** brings the Carmelites vividly to life, explores how archaeologists investigated the site and shares their extraordinary discoveries.

From Apperley 'apple-tree wood' to Hartpury 'pear-tree with hard pears', Saintbury 'Saewine's enclosure' to Dymock 'fort of the pigs', Gloucestershire's place names tell us more about our ancestors than we could ever imagine! Join Cambridge historian **Simon Draper**, leading expert in landscape archaeology,

as he explores the fascinating hidden history of Gloucestershire's place-names, revealing the mysteries they unlock about the county's people, places and landscapes more than 1,000 years ago.

Andrew Heavens tells the extraordinary story of Ethiopia's 'Elgin Marbles', the Victorian kidnap of a young Ethiopian Prince who was taken to England with the country's treasures and the campaign to return them to their original home. They tell tales of African loot and plunder – treasures stolen in the days of Empire and now stashed in Western museums - exploring where the treasures ended up and how those institutions are responding to mounting calls for their return.



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
